OUR SPEAKERS

Emily Crawford, Head of Innovation and Impact - Glasspool Charity Trust

Emily has worked in social policy and research for over 15 years in the think tank and consultancy sectors. Her policy specialisms include financial resilience, health and social care, and welfare to work and food security.



In recent years her work has focused on evaluation and helping her clients - primarily social purpose organisations – to understand their impact and improve their delivery. Now working in-house at RL Glasspool, Emily is supporting the Board and senior leadership explore the processes and principles of evaluation to assess and explore their impact and reflect on future development.

Jessie Dillon, Impact and Evaluation Manager - Buttle UK

Jessie is Impact and Evaluation Manager for Buttle UK, an individual grant-maker for people experiencing crisis while living in poverty. In addition to leading impact analysis through surveying, interviewing and reaching out to their grantees, Jessie is also responsible for specific research projects both internally and externally (funded and voluntarily).



Jessie's research background began first with her social sciences BA(Hons), followed by an MRes postgraduate degree, which focused on capturing the experiences and voice of young children in research. A subsequent foray into teaching and deputy headship built her knowledge of the importance of understanding people's lived experiences in practice. Now she's using these skills to lead the research programme at Buttle UK, working with children, young people and adults to improve their work.

Dr Allie Bennington, Head of Evaluation & Assurance - Help for Heroes

Dr Allie Bennington has been Head of Evaluation & Assurance at Help for Heroes for over 4 years and in the charity for 10 years. She provides professional accountability and leadership of the Evaluation and Impact function, leading the development, continuous improvement and quality delivery of the charity's evaluation and impact measurement capability.



Allie has previously held several appointments as an Officer in the British Army in both Defence Intelligence and Defence Recovery positions. Allie inherently understands that the service-user is the single most valuable asset in a charity and is driven by the pursuit of evaluation data and feedback from beneficiaries on a continuous basis. She seeks to put a spotlight on the positive experiences and outcomes achieved by beneficiaries - and the issues that need to be investigated - to generate a powerful and sustained stream of data that indicates what's working well and to help improve the quality of the beneficiary's experience.

Faye McGuinness, Director of Programmes -Education Support

Faye is responsible for the development of new services and programmes at Education Support, as well as having oversight of our Department for Education and Welsh Government funded programmes. This includes oversight of evaluation and impact work relating to the programmes being delivered.
